CAC President's Message

Hello CAC Members and Riverside County SELPA Community! My name is Vicky Iqueda, your CAC President. As we approach the end of the 2023 school year I want to take a moment to share how grateful and honored I have been to serve as your CAC President this year. At the CAC we are blessed to have a strong Executive Board willing to serve and a dedicated SELPA team ready to support us in all activities and meetings planned. This year we transitioned from virtual back to in-person meetings and workshops. The CAC Exec Board started our year with a very positive summer planning meeting where we determined the topics our community was interested in. We started the year with a "Donuts with Directors" event that was a success. We presented an IEP toolkit for families, and had a Transitional presentation on our students' options for life after high school. We had an informative attorney presentation on special needs trusts planning and conservatorship. We also presented on how to keep our Students Socialized after COVID and beyond. The CAC participated in an amazing Lego / E-sports event with RCOE and planned a Family / Sibling Workshop day with Mini Golf Fun!

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Celebrating Families and Siblings Event

On April 1, 2023 the RC SELPA Community Advisory Committee held a family event titled, "Celebrating Families and Siblings of Students with Disabilities." This free event allowed families to come together to learn more about how to support those family members with disabilities. The Riverside County SELPA Mental Health team held small group sessions, one for parents, and one for siblings, while students with disabilities engaged in a variety of sensory activities with our CAC members and volunteers. During the breakout sessions students engaged in hands on activities around identifying feelings and how to help others when they are struggling with their own feelings. Parents engaged in self care routines as well as how different children respond differently.

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LEGO Fun Fair

The Riverside County Office of Education and the Riverside County SELPA with the support of the Community Advisory Committee put together a LEGO Funfair. This opportunity was put together due to the efforts of many department across Riverside County collaborating in honor of creating more inclusive opportunities for students with disabilities.

Executive Director of Special Education at RCOE, Barbara Sorter, received a large donation of Legos, she used this donation to create the LEGO Funfair in partnership with the RCOE E-Sports, RC SELPA CAC, and the Santa Claus inc.

Families were able to come and see their student with disabilities engage with high school mentors on completing a LEGO set. Then, students were given the opportunity to engage in some esports activities. This opportunity allowed students to create a sense of belonging, boost self-confidence. This event was held again in the Spring in the Desert region so that our large county could have an opportunity to engage in this event as well. It was a huge success.

Student Spotlight

This student spotlight comes from Santa Rosa Academy, a charter school located in Menifee, CA. Jaela Hernandez is a 9th grade student and has Mucopolysaccharidosis which is a rare genetic disease. Despite this, she fully participates in everything at school and brings much joy to everyone she meets. She loves music and signing and would love to be a performer one day.

MPS is short for Mucopolysaccharidosis, a rare genetic disease that affects 1 in 100,000 live births. This disease doesn't allow her body to produce enough enzymes to properly break down sugar molecules that are found throughout her body which leads to numerous health problems.

Like Jaela, most individuals impacted by MPS appear to be healthy at birth and experience a short period of normal development, followed by a decline in physical and or mental function. As the condition progresses, it may affect appearance, physical abilities, and organ function including the heart, joints, respiratory and nervous system. Fortunately for Jaela, she was diagnosed at a very young age, allowing her to start treatments right away.

Jaela underwent Chemotherapy, had a bone marrow transplant, and had ERT (Enzyme Replacement Therapy) which she will continue for the remainder of her life. ERT replenishes her body with the enzymes that her body cannot naturally produce. Jaela has had several surgeries and will continue throughout her life.

It was special to not only see parents support other parents, but being surrounded by those that understand the unique circumstance that each of them work with each day.

The day concluded with families having the opportunity to work together in a family team mini gold course that was custom made by our Member at Large, Cindy Lees', husband. These mini golf holes were accessible by any and all students regardless of need or disability. Families loved this opportunity to work together and most importantly have fun together. Thank you to the CAC and RC SELPA staff for making this event happen.

To close out the year we had a parent from the CAC and her children in special education join our SELPA Director in Sacramento to meet our Legislators and present our community needs. It was a night full of emotions and fun all because of our Special Needs Community. 

Adaptive sports included wheelchair basketball, baseball, football, soccer, tennis, golf and much more. Both team were mixed and all the athletes enjoyed sharing the dugout and field together as they cheered for one another.

As students engaged in sports, parents, caregivers, and community members were able to visit the resource fair. Resources ranged in the area of educational, sports, and health. Some organizations in attendance were: Ezekiel's Gift Of Love Coachella Valley Down Syndrome Foundation, GANAS, We Can Fish, United Cerebral Palsy of the Inland Empire, Desert Recreation District, CV Arabs football and SoCal Adaptive Sports. This is the first event that highlighted adaptive sports to include all members at CVUSD and hopefully the first of many to come.

Her laughter is contagious, and she is just a joy to be around. With your help we can continue to fund research to find a cure for MPS/ML. The National MPS Society is a non-profit organization dedicated to improving the lives of children and families who are impacted by these genetic diseases and to help fund research for a cure.
